Schools with credentialed teacher librarians, especially full-time ones, are more likely to have library staff who:

Teach digital literacy skills to students



had librarians who teach students about digital literacy at least two to three times a month.

School librarians are crucial in fostering a love for learning among students. They collaborate closely with teachers to plan instruction, ensuring that students receive a comprehensive education that includes the development of essential skills, such as critical thinking and digital literacy.

Support literacy teaching to students





Virtually all schools reported having librarians who support literacy teaching.

- More likely to more fully implement state standards for school libraries.
- Schedule student and teacher access to school libraries to maximize the library's fulfillment
 of its potential as the school's largest classroom.
- Provide spaces that maximize learning opportunities—particularly collaborative, inquirybased ones—including space for full classes, space for smaller groups and individuals, and makerspaces.
- Support classes visiting libraries in a range of ways from teaching students basic library skills to guiding them as they pursue more complex research projects.
- Have larger collections, more access to technology-based resources and learning tools, and larger budgets that support providing needed print, non-print, and online resources.

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
